

The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government has received continuation funding (Violence Against Women Act) from the Kentucky Justice Cabinet for the operation of a Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner program. The purpose of this program is to improve the collection of forensic evidence in sexual assault cases and to provide the victims of sexual assault more humane treatment during the investigation. Ultimately, higher rates of reporting will occur along with higher rates of prosecution and conviction. The Kentucky Crime Victims' Compensation Fund also provides financial support for forensic examinations.

An approved element of the grant-funded project is contracting with certified Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (S.A.N.E.s) to serve on call twenty-four hours a day to respond to calls for examinations at the University of Kentucky Emergency Room.

The attached Professional Services Agreement with Victoria Nash for the period of February 1, 2012, through December 31, 2012, outline the responsibilities and compensation. Funds for these services are budgeted as follows:

### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING 252-12 BETWEEN THE KNOXVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT AND LEXINGTON (KENTUCKY) DIVISION OF POLICE

This Memorandum of Understanding, by and between the KNOXVILLE POLICE DEPARTMENT (hereinafter called "KPD") and the LEXINGTON (KENTUCKY) DIVISION OF POLICE (hereinafter called "LDP").

### **WITNESSETH:**

WHEREAS, KPD and LDP recognize the benefits of allow their members to observe, learn from, and exchange ideas from each other through ride-alongs with the other agency; and

WHEREAS, the agencies wish to formalize a program allowing for such interagency ride-alongs.

NOW, THEREFORE, in order to carry out the intent of the parties, KPD and LDP enter into this Memorandum of Understanding and agree that:


- 1. Each agency will bear the cost of the program for its respective officers, including but not limited to transportation to and from other jurisdiction, accommodations, and per diem.
- 2. Members of each agency participating in the program will be under the direct supervision of the appropriate command staff of the agency member they are assigned to ride along with. If issues with regard to inappropriate behavior (defined as behavior detrimental to the operation of the program or the agency, behavior which inhibits enforcement of laws or administration of justice or behavior which otherwise reflects poorly on either agency) arise, the participating member will be sent back to his or her home agency and the member's agency will address any discipline issue according to their policies and procedures.
- 3. KPD and LDP members will be subject to their agency's respective general orders and directives while participating in the program and will abide by the host agency's directives during the ride-along assignments.

- 4. KPD and LDP members will testify in court if needed as a result of activity that occurred during the member's ride-along. Every effort will be made by each agency not to involve the ride-along in prosecution of a case. Each agency will bear the expense for their members who must testify in court resulting from their ride-along.
- 5. Subject to any statutory limits, KPD and LDP agree to assume liability for the death, injury or disability of their respective members with the exception of injury or death proximately resulting from any negligence or intentional misconduct on the part of the host agency. No party hereto shall settle any claim for liability where another party hereto has the obligation to indemnify without the consent of the indemnifying party.
- 6. KPD general order 1.35, section III. and LDP special order \_\_\_\_\_ are incorporated as part of this Memorandum of Understanding.

The Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority has given A Great American Brand, LLC; dba A&W Restaurants, Inc. preliminary approval to participate in the Kentucky Business Investment (KBI) Program. The KBI Program requests that the state and local government enter into a 10-year agreement with the approved company under which the business can recover up to 100% of its start-up costs and 50% of the annual rent costs through Kentucky corporate income tax credits and a wage assessment fee of up to 4%.

A&W Restaurants, Inc. decision to remain and grow in our community and expand its operations in Lexington will create wealth and provide additional job opportunities for citizens. The company plans to create 30 new jobs with an average wage of approximately \$72,800.00 per year plus benefits. A&W Restaurants, Inc. plans to invest nearly \$2,000,000.00 in equipment, building improvements, start-up costs and lease costs for a 10-year period.

### ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY COMMITTEE February 28, 2012 Summary

Chair Blues called the meeting to order at 1:0 PM. All members were present except Myers. Kay was also present.

### 1. Empower Lexington

Susan Bush presented the Empower Lexington project. She explained that Empower Lexington is a plan to make Lexington more energy efficient.

Bush stated that in 2009 Council authorized LFUCG to participate in the voluntary Cities for Climate Protection Program. Under the Program communities agreed to develop local plan to lower energy use and emissions.

Bush stated that this is a voluntary plan and it contains no mandates or restrictions. It sets a target to reduce community energy consumption use by 1% annually.

Bush stated that the Plan identifies opportunities for reducing energy use, it is designed to be flexible and developed through a consensus process.

The Plan contains 27 recommendations (see attached).

Bush stated that the planning effort started in 2009 and received substantial public input.

Bush stated that they would like come back later this spring to Council with a resolution supporting the plan.

Once adopted progress will be reviewed every 2 years and LFUCG will quantify community wide energy use and emissions every 5 years.

Councilmember asked about the next step. In response Bush stated that they will identify parties that will be responsible for implementing components of the plan.

Councilmember Henson stated that education was the key.

Councilmember Lane asked about Kentucky electricity usage and suggested that usage was high because of the low cost.

Councilmember Kay asked about the 5 year energy consumption and emissions output every 5 years. He suggested that that may need to be done on a shorter time period. In response Tom Webb stated that it was very labor intensive and it was a matter of available resources.

Councilmember Blues asked about mandatory recycling.

Vice Mayor Gorton asked about the resolution. In response Bush stated that they would like to come back later this spring for formal adoption.

Edward Kuske spoke about the water quality fee structure.














### 2010- 201<u>1</u> Overall Increase in Reported Larcenies








