I am requesting Urban County Council approval to enter into a lease agreement with T. Warfield Kinkead for space located at 350 East Main Street in Lexington. The area is located on the first floor of the building and consists of approximately 4,961 S/ft of space. The Community Alternative Program (CAP) will relocate to this location along with the Partners for Youth Program.

The term of this agreement will be for a period of thirty-six (36) months, beginning June 1, 2012 and ending on May 31, 2015. The lease may be extended for two (2) additional terms of one (1) year each with the second and final term ending on May 31, 2017.

JUSTIFICATION FOR LEASE

The Division of Emergency Management (DEM) is currently being relocated to the now-vacant LFUCG-owned facility located at 115 Cisco Road (aka Old Youth Detention Center).

DEM, CAP and the Partners for Youth Programs are currently housed in a leased facility consisting of approximately 15,868 S/ft of space with an annual rental rate of approximately \$126,944.00 per year (utilities & O&M not included).

Relocation of the occupants will reduce the current annual rent expenditure to a 3-year average annual rate of \$42,000.00 (utilities & O&M not included).

Projected annual rent savings of \$84,900.00 (utilities & O&M not included).

Decreasing the amount of leased space from 15,868 to 4,961 S/ft (-10,907 S/ft).

The attached action amends Section 21-5 of the Code of Ordinances, abolishing one (1) position of Human Resources Manager Sr. (Grade 121E) and one (1) position of Payroll Analyst (Grade 115E) and creating one (1) position of Deputy Director Human Resources (Grade 122E) and one (1) position of Administrative Specialist Sr. (Grade 112N) in the Division of Human Resources, effective upon passage by Council.

The Division of Human Resources has undergone significant changes, resulting in the necessity to have an individual with a broad range of knowledge across HR. LFUCG is now operating under six collective bargaining agreements with four separate union entities which increase the oversight and management resources that must be dedicated to proper operations. The Deputy Director would be responsible for this oversight. Abolishing the Payroll Analyst position and using the funds would more effectively be served by adding an administrative support function to support the volume of requests for services in multiple areas of the division.

The fiscal impact for FY2013 (21 pay periods) will be a savings of \$5,747.81. All costs include benefits.

RE: Lease Agreement with Community Trust Bank

I am requesting Urban County Council approval to enter into a lease agreement with Community Trust Bank for approximately 0.0884 acres of land located at 121 East High Street. The parcel is located between South Limestone Street and South Martin Luther King Blvd. The bank currently leases the parcel and it is used for a remote drive-through banking facility with stacking lanes, and for parking. The existing agreement is set to expire on July 31, 2012.

The initial term of this agreement will be for a period of one (1) year and seven (7) months, beginning August 1, 2012 and ending on February 28, 2014 with an option of renewal for two (2) additional five (5) year terms. ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY COMMITTEE June 26, 2012 Summary

Chair Blues called the meeting to order at 1:05 PM. Stinnett, Gorton, Farmer, McChord, Martin & Henson were also present.

5.15.12 Environmental Quality Committee Summary. On a motion by Farmer second Gorton the 5.15.12 summary was approved.

Capital Flooding Severity Score Re Evaluation. Division of Water Quality Engineer Greg Lubeck made the presentation. He explained why the staff wants to re-examine the severity score system. He stated that the proposed system is objective-based, whereas the current system can be very subjective. He also stated that, due to the unpredictable nature of funding, it is difficult to move projects through quickly.

A motion by Farmer, second Gorton, to move this item to the full Council passed without dissent.

Indefinite Service Agreements re Consent Decree Remedial Measures Projects. Director of Water Quality Charlie Martin gave this presentation. He stated that this activity should improve the efficiency and effectiveness of remedial measures projects. He noted that the RFQ approach that receives competing quotes from prequalified firms is preferred.

He said that, to avoid conflicts with existing procurement policy, DWQ will recommend amending the procurement guidance associated with Ordinance 162-2011.

Because these amendments will take time and require Council approval, DWQ will use the existing pre-qualified list and process to get some early FY13 designs underway for the Remedial Measure Plan (Consent Decree) projects in order to keep the ball rolling until the ordinance amendment question is resolved. Martin also stated that a small business set-aside opportunity, specifically related to Remedial Measure Plan work, is being proposed and will likely be presented for Council consideration simultaneously with the proposed ordinance amendment.

In addition, he suggested that LFUCG review the right-of-way acquisition process, as it is very inefficient and delays projects.

Public Comment. No member of the public spoke.

On a motion by Gorton, second Henson, the meeting was adjourned at 2:20 PM.

Planning and Public Works Committee June 19th, 2012 Summary and Motions

CM Bill Farmer chaired the meeting and called it to order at 1:02pm. All Committee members were present.

Animal Ordinance

Beard began a discussion on the origin of the draft animal ordinance. He stated that he had received a complaint of a horse being kept in the backyard of a home on Tacoma. The horse had escaped and did not have adequate water or grazing space. He said that the horse has since been moved to an appropriate location. Because of the attention the horse issue received, other instances came to light regarding pigs and goats.

Beard told Committee members that the sub-committee formed to review this matter had met and they prepared the draft ordinance that was included in the packet.

Kay told the Committee members that the timing was coincidental, because he had also been approached by members of the community with an interest in urban farming. He said that they had decided to separate horses out of the draft ordinance and focus solely on the keeping of hogs, goats (pygmy, dwarf, or miniature) and pigs (potbelly or miniature).

Kay said that goats, hogs, and pigs are currently prohibited and the draft ordinance would now allow them. They would not be allowed to create significant problems for neighboring properties. Kay went on to say that the husbandry of goats is growing nationally.

Lawless asked Kay about chickens and roosters. Kay told her that they are not included in the draft ordinance.

Gorton asked Kay about noise, housing standards, and provisions for unwanted and abandoned animals. Kay said that the noise issue would be enforced by the Division of Police. He said that the space requirements and animal size limitations are spelled out in the ordinance. He said that slaughter must be out of the view of neighbors and noted that there is a slaughter ordinance already on the books.

Susan Malcolm, the President of the Lexington Humane Society, said that Animal Care and Control has limited space to house abandoned animals. Malcolm said that although they have not had to deal with more than five pigs or goats over the past few years, the passing of the ordinance could increase that number and more money may be required

to handle the increase in animals. She did say, however, that goats pose a limited distraction to people.

Henson was called to speak and said that she had many concerns. She mentioned abandoned animals and also the increase in animal waste. Henson asked Kay about the number of goats or pigs a resident could have. (No more than six goats and no more than two pigs.)

Martin asked Kay if these animals would be allowed in commercial areas. Martin said that as the ordinance is written, nothing would prevent a commercial area from keeping these animals. Martin also requested the space between property lines and expressed concern that the animals could be living right up against property lines.

Martin also suggested an overlay district as an alternative to the proposed ordinance.

Lawless said that she doesn't see a need to have male goats because they do not produce milk and she said rarely are these types of animals slaughtered, as they are usually kept as pets. Lawless also mentioned the smell of urine on the beards of male goats.

Gorton asked Kay if the sub-committee discussed these types of animals as pets or food. Kay said that they discussed both uses. She asked sub-committee members if they entertained the idea of having these types of animals in the urban service area as a conditional use. Kay said no.

Martin said that there are zones in Fayette County for a specific reason and again suggested a ND-1 overlay for neighborhoods that may want to allow goats and pigs.

Henson stated that there are responsible owners out there, but she said that the ordinance is wide open and stands available for abuse.

Blues said that he could not support moving it on to the full Council to deliberation.

Public Comment

Juanita Gallivan, Lara Doth de Martinez, Donna Martinez, Devin Doth, and Jeremy Porter spoke.

Beard made a motion to keep the animal ordinance in the Planning and Public Works Committee. Lawless seconded the motion. The motion passed 8-2.

Martin and Ellinger voted no.

Design Excellence Update

Blues gave an update on the Design Excellence Task Force. Blues said that there have been significant developments since the January 24th, 2012 report he gave to the Committee.

Blues said that Mayor Gray included \$50,000 in Commissioner Paulsen's budget for a consultant to write design guidelines and draft related ordinances governing the downtown core that the Task Force has selected as their focus area. Blues mentioned the studies focused on downtown: Downtown Master Plan, Courthouse Area Design Guidelines, and the Downtown Lexington Building Inventory.

Blues said that the sub-groups will:

- Conduct a detailed inventory and analysis of downtown B-2 zones.
- Review and analyze our current Courthouse Area Design Guidelines to assess strengths, weaknesses, and gaps.
- Recommend the selection of a consultant, which will involve the drafting and publishing of an RFT and the evaluation of responses.
- In the future, a group will begin drafting zoning text amendments and administrative permitting procedures.

Blues asked to be placed on the November 20th, 2012 meeting agenda to present another Design Excellence Task Force update.

Items in Committee

No discussion.

Martin made a motion to adjourn. Gorton seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.

Public Safety Committee

June 26th, 2012 Summary and Motions

Vice Chair CM Doug Martin called the meeting to order at 11:02am. Council Members present were CM Chuck Ellinger, CM Chris Ford, CM Julian Beard, CM Bill Farmer, CM Kevin Stinnett, CM Jay McChord, and CM Peggy Henson.

Chair CM Diane Lawless arrived at the meeting at 11:25am. CM K.C. Crosbie was absent.

Public Safety Disability Claims

Martin introduced Ed Gardner from the Department of Law who began his presentation. Gardner said that the LFUCG Policemen's and Firefighter's Pension Fund (PFRF) was created by state statute, KRS 67A.360 and in general, changes must be accomplished by amendments to KRS.

Gardner said that statutory changes for new hires would be permissible for calculation of final compensation, benefit factors, eligibility for unreduced service retirement benefits and insurance eligibility. He went on to explain that the possible changes for current employees and retirees are limited to cost of living adjustments (COLA), cost of purchase of service (ghost time), payment options, and disability pension payments.

Gardner told committee members that there are two types of disability pensions: occupational and non-occupational. The member is eligible for a non-occupational disability annuity only after five years of employment. They make an application to the Pension board and are then is sent to two appropriate doctors. The reports are sent to the Pension board for a decision. If the member is disabled from occupational injury, the benefit is 60% of the last rate of salary. The occupational benefit is increased if the disability percentage exceeds 20%. The non-occupational annuity is 2.5% of a member's average salary for each full year of total service, and is subject to a 25% minimum and a 75% maximum. Gardner also said that since the member is disabled if he/she is unable to perform "the duties of any assigned position in the service, a minor disability can qualify for an annuity."

Gardner informed the committee members that there are potential changes that LFUCG can make including:

- Create job descriptions in police and fire departments to permit minimally disabled officers to maintain employment.
- Extend the period allowed for injury leave and modified duty to allow members to recover for full return to their duties.

Gardner said that the time periods have already been extended considerably in collective bargaining agreements:

- Police: 12 months plus additional six months at Chief's discretion if the doctor provides a definitive return to full duty date.
- Fire: 12 months plus up to an additional 12 months based on doctor's definitive return to work date.

There was a discussion about light duty opportunities and Commissioner Clay Mason said that the administration would be happy to examine potential opportunities. Mason went on to say that there is less incentive to go out on disability with other entities then there is with LFUCG. He did stress, however, that the Kentucky State Police have more opportunities for light duty assignments.

Henson asked Mason if they could place these employees into jobs at E-911. Gardner said that E-911 has a different retirement system but Mason told Henson that they do utilize E-911 for temporary light duty assignments.

Council Members asked Gardner about an employee retiring with just a 1% disability and he said that although that would be possible, he has never seen it happen.

Martin asked Gardner where the interpretation of the ordinance came from. The total disability definition is as follows:

67A.360 (16) "shall mean a disability which substantially precludes a person from performing with reasonable regularity the substantial and material parts of any gainful work or occupation in the service of the department that he would be competent to perform were it not for the fact that the impairment is founded upon conditions which render it reasonably certain that it will continue indefinitely."

Gardner said that it was been interpreted this way for years, and he believes it has been interpreted correctly.

Susan Combs came to the podium and told the committee members that the doctors see both the job description and the ordinance when they examine the patient.

Martin told committee members that he wanted to explore the assumptions of KRS 67A.360 and also look at the reasons why LFUCG is so different from CERS.

Lawless told Martin that the only way they can change this is to go through the state legislature and Martin said that he disagreed.

Lawless called Patrick Johnston from the Division of Risk Management to the podium. Johnston said that Workers Compensation has a 30% penalty for unsafe conditions and LFUCG must be careful when allowing workers to come back to work that are not 100%.

Johnston recommended that the committee bring an expert in to look at the work habits in both professions. Johnston also recommended a managed care system.

Beard said that he had reviewed the firefighter job application and it does not specify whether a firefighter needs to be able to lift 3 ounces or 300 pounds. He said that he feels there are many shades of gray in the application.

Henson asked Johnston if he could provide the number of how many police and fire employees retired on occupational disability vs. non-occupational disability. Johnston said that he could provide the numbers on occupational disability retirements.

Martin asked Mason about the physical fitness tests that are in place for police and fire. Mason said that he is not aware of annual agility testing. Mason said that there are physical fitness tests that are administered annually. Martin also asked Mason about any initiatives that the Administration has in place and Mason mentioned the Pension Task Force.

Martin told Lawless that he would like to keep the issue in committee and bring ordinances to the committee for consideration.

Henson asked Martin if the Pension Task Force had discussed the issue of disability claims and Martin said that they had not.

Martin told committee members that he wants to do everything that can be done to make the work conditions safe for LFUCG police and firefighters. He wants to examine the procedural and occupational issues.

Mason mentioned to the committee that the police and fire Chiefs are putting small work groups together to look at various issues in their departments. The disability issue is a topic they are prepared to discuss.

Items Referred

Mason agreed to present on the chronic nuisance properties at the July 10th meeting.

Beard asked that the public safety disability claims be placed on the agenda for the July 10th meeting. Lawless agreed to do so.

Beard made a motion to adjourn. Martin seconded the motion. The motion passed without dissent.
