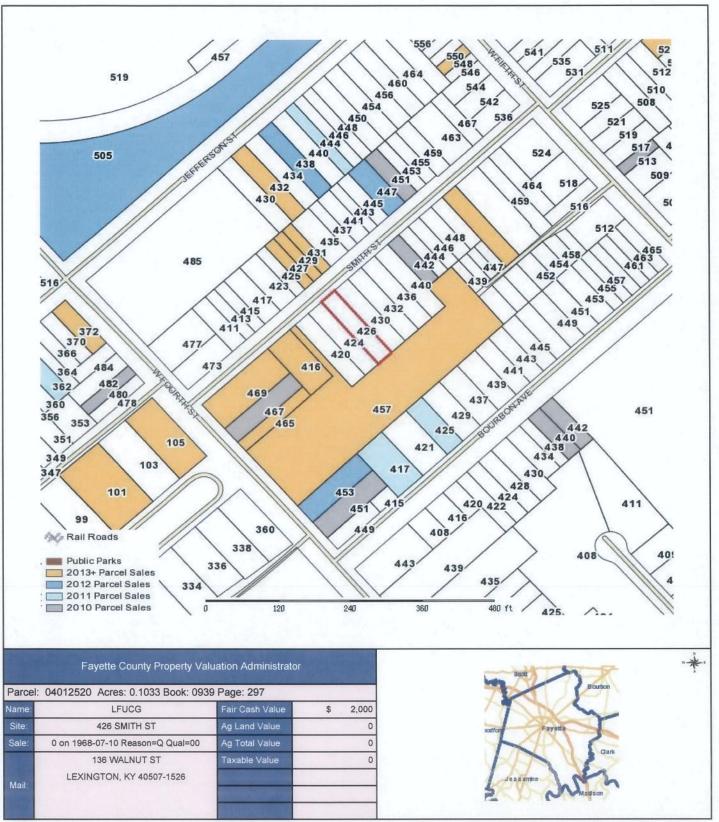

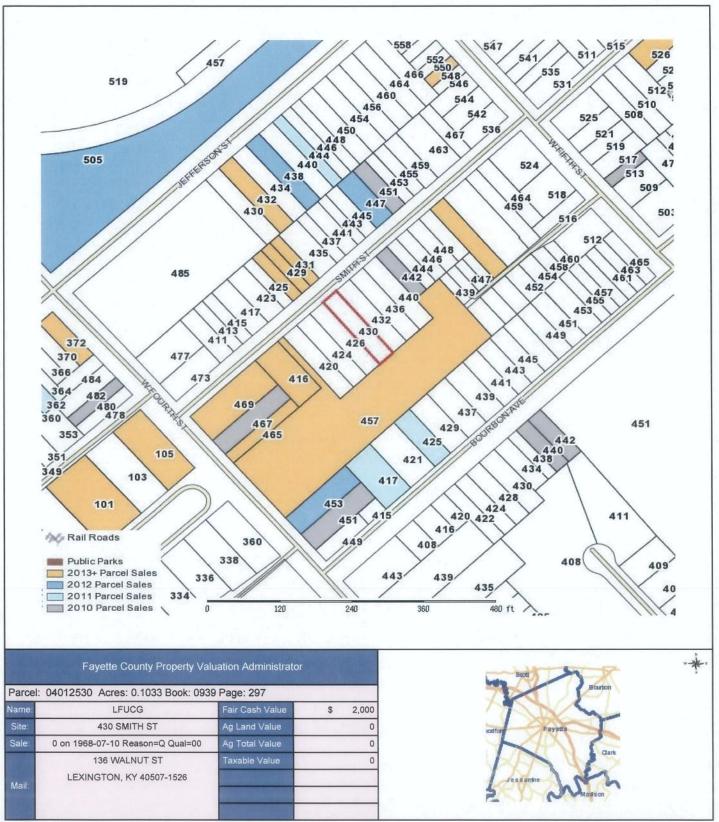

Source of funds is the U.S. Department of Justice, Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program. Council approved acceptance of these funds on March 21, 2013 (Resolution 136-2013).

The approved Street Sales Enforcement project includes funds to offset the cost of the "Fast Track" prosecution program and the Major Violator (Repeat Offender) prosecution program in the Commonwealth Attorney's Office, as part of a drug task force. Funds are used to support one full-time assistant prosecutor for a one-year period.

The Division of Water Quality requests Urban County Council approval authorizing the Mayor to enter into an amendment to the lease with WINMAR Corporation for office space located at 125 Lisle Industrial Road. The additional space will allow the Division of Water Quality to house new employees and provide office, meeting and training space required to meet UCG operational needs including meeting obligations required by the Consent Decree.

The original lease began on February 1, 2011 and was for a term of three years with two, one-year extensions approved at a higher rate. Current cost per square foot including all utilities, parking, and custodial services is \$15.25. The two one-year extensions will be billed at \$15.75 per square foot and will provide the same services. Also included in these costs are the fit-up required to make the space appropriate to meet our needs.

This amendment covers the remainder of the original lease which will end January 31, 2014 and will carry forward for any desired renewals allowed by the agreement. Requested increase in space of 10,118 square feet will take the total space included in the lease to 25,449 square feet.

Annual impact to the budget for FY14 for the increase in square footage will be \$130,690.84. This is based on the cost of the additional space at \$15.25 per square foot for five months between September 1, 2013 – January 31, 2014 (\$64,291.46), and \$15.75 per square foot for the five months between February 1, 2014 – June 30, 2014 (\$66,399.38). The Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government annually receives federal funds for operation of its mobility office (Ridesharing program), funded from the Surface Transportation Program-Lexington (SLX) and operated by the Division of Planning. Acceptance of these funds for Fiscal Year 2014 was approved by Council on April 25, 2013 (Resolution No. 179-2013).

The approved grant project provides for the design and implementation of a marketing campaign that will increase the public's awareness of air quality issues and encourage the use of transportation alternatives. The Kentucky Energy and Environment Cabinet for Environmental Protection/Kentucky Division of Water has offered the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government an award of federal funds in the amount of \$300,000 for implementation of the Wolf Run Watershed Based Plan. In March 2013 the *Wolf Run Watershed Based Plan* was completed. This plan lays out a path forward to improve water quality in Wolf Run and its tributaries through public involvement, education, and implementation of Best Management Practices (BMPs).

The goals for this project relate to successful implementation of two of the High Priority BMPs identified in the *Wolf Run Watershed Based Plan*. Goals include improvement of warm water aquatic habitat and reduction of non-point source pollution entering Gardenside Tributary, Cardinal Run, Vaughn's Branch, and Wolf Run through Retrofit of the Cross Keys Park Retention Basin and Stream Enhancement and Constructed Wetlands in Picadome Park. Public involvement and public education goals are tied to BMP implementation efforts.

Project Activities include engineering evaluations, design, permitting, and construction activities related to successful completion of the two High Priority BMP projects. Project Activities related to public involvement and education include holding public meetings with a design charrette and collaboration with the established Wolf Run Watershed Council.

The source of federal funds is the Environmental Protection Agency's Section 319(h) Nonpoint Source Pollution Control Program. A 40% match in the amount of \$200,000 is required. Matching funds are being budgeted from personnel costs in the divisions of Water Quality and Environmental Policy (\$36,000) and \$164,000 from the Water Quality Management Fund. Total project cost is \$500,000.

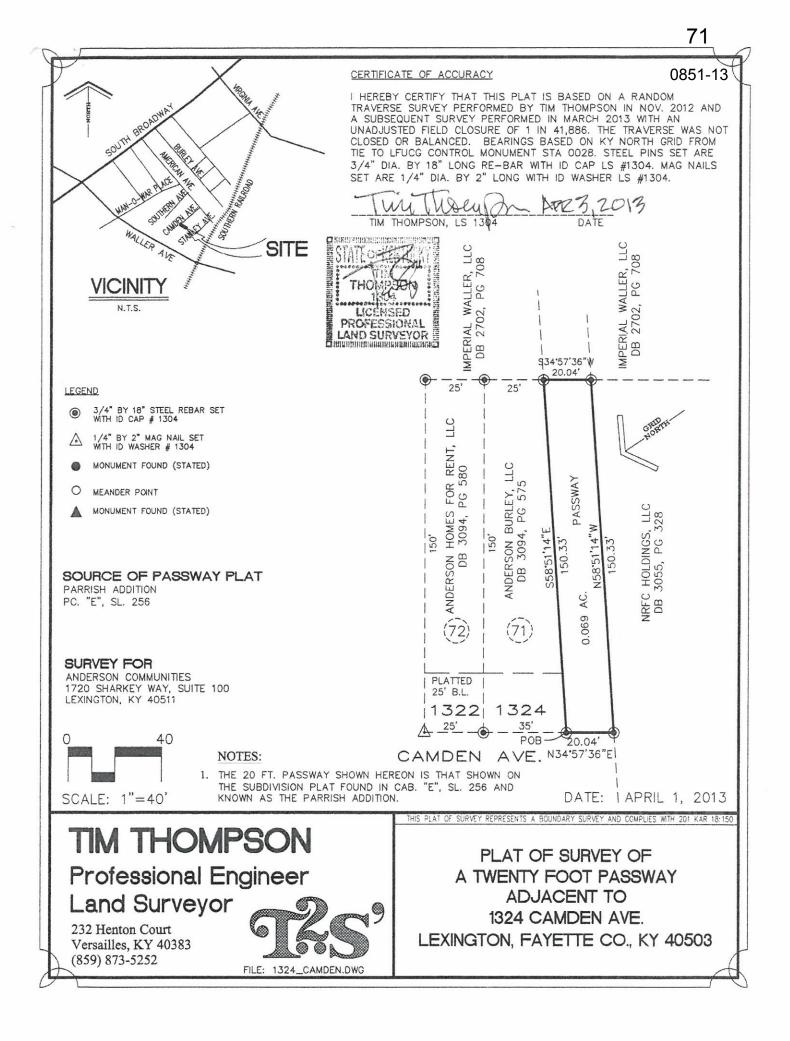

RE: Residential Parking Permit District – Miller Street

In early April, 2013, the residents of Miller Street requested the establishment of a Residential Permit Parking District for the following times: 24 hours per day, Monday through Sunday.

The Lexington and Fayette County Parking Authority staff determined that this area of Miller Street contains approximately 5 legal parking spaces totaling 5 for the Study area. The 5 parking spaces are located on the South side of Miller Street, near the addresses of 220-240 Miller Street. A study was conducted between June 19th and July 2nd of 2013 (business days only) using license plate information of vehicles registered to residents in this Study area. This Study data revealed that non-residents used most all of the available curbside parking.

In order for a street or part of a street to be qualified for the RPP District designation, Section III-(b) items (1) and (2) of the Residential Parking Permit Program must be met. Section III-(b) items (1) and (2) state:

(1) The total number of curbside parking spaces occupied by vehicles equals or exceeds seventy-five percent (75%) of the number of curbside parking spaces on the public streets, roads and highways of the proposed residential parking permit area; and

(2) The total number of curbside parking spaces occupied by vehicles whose operators do not reside within the proposed residential parking permit area equals or exceeds twenty-five percent (25%) of the total number of curbside parking spaces occupied by vehicles.

The attached spreadsheet shows that the range of available curbside parking spaces utilized for all vehicles ranged from 1 spaces (20.00% of available) to 5 spaces (100.00% of available). The *minimum* number of vehicles owned by *residents* observed in the available curbside spaces was 0 vehicle (0% of available), and the *maximum* observed

was 0 vehicles (0% of available). The *minimum* number of vehicles owned by *nonresidents* observed in the available curbside spaces was 1 vehicles (20.00% of available), and the *maximum* observed was 5 vehicles (100.00% of available). Therefore, the requirement of Section III-(b) (1) was met on 3 of the 10 days during the study, and the requirement of Section III-(b) (2) was met on 8 of the 10 days during the study.

Based upon the above study, the criteria defined in Section III-(b) of the Residential Parking Permit Program has been satisfied. Therefore, the Lexington & Fayette County Parking Authority recommends that this section of roadway be designated as a Residential Permit Parking District.

Bluegrass Community Foundation in conjunction with a Local Food Coordinator Advisory Committee has accumulated funding from several sources to support the creation of a Local Food Coordinator position in the Office of the Mayor. The Local Food Coordinator's responsibilities will include serving as an advocate for policies, provide education, convene potential collaborators, and support projects that lead to increased markets for local farm products. The position will also support consumer education, with an emphasis on underserved populations by encouraging nutrition education and increasing the availability and purchase of wholesome foods to underserved populations.

Funds to support this project come from the Kentucky Agricultural Development Board (\$25,000), Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky (\$25,000), Mount Brilliant Family Foundation (\$10,000), and matching funds from Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government (\$25,000). Funds will be used to support a full-time position in the Office of the Mayor under the direction of the Chief Development Officer. Total available funding for project is \$82,601.74.

Council authorization to accept award of funds in the amount of \$57, 601.74 from Bluegrass Community Foundation is hereby requested.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE July 9, 2013 Meeting Summary

Chair Beard called the meeting to order at 1:02 PM. All members present except Gorton.

1. April 23, 2013 Committee Summary

On a motion by Lane, second Farmer, the summary of the 4.23.13 meeting was approved unanimously.

2. Itinerant Merchant Ordinance

Henson introduced the issue. She stated that she met with David Barberie after the Committee packet was distributed. She then requested that Barberie amend the draft removing sections pertaining to mobile food units as that was dealt with the Food Truck Ordinance.

Barberie summarized the revised draft ordinance (dated 7.8.13). The summary included definition, hours of operation, locations and exceptions, including an exemption for charitable organizations.

A motion was made by Akers, second Henson to approve the 7.8.13 Itinerant Merchant Ordinance.

A motion was made by Lawless, second Farmer to amend the door to door sales hours - sec 15-12(b)(2) - to 9 AM to **7PM** from 9AM to 9 PM.

Clarke spoke against the amendment. Lawless withdrew the amendment.

Motion was made by Lawless, second Farmer to amend the door to door sales hours to 9 AM to **8PM** from 9AM to 9 PM. Amendment passed on a 10-2 vote (Farmer, Lane- No; Gorton, Stinnett, Myers- Absent)

Farmer spoke against the motion as the community had not had an opportunity to review and comment on it the revised ordinance.

Lane spoke against the motion as it infringed on business activities.

Henson stated that she was in favor of the ordinance because transient businesses should be subject to increased regulation.

The original motion as amended passed on a 9-4 vote (Kay, Lane, Clarke, Farmer-No; Gorton, Stinnett-absent).

3. Commerce Lexington Quarterly Activity Report

Gina Greathouse presented the quarterly report. She discussed marketing trips to Dallas, TX; Charleston, SC; Anaheim, CA; Chicago, IL; and San Francisco, CA, as well a trade mission to Canada.

Greathouse also discussed an effort to grow the information technology, software and gaming market. She introduced John Mester with RunJumpDev. RunJumpDev sent a team to the PAX Expo in Boston with support from Commerce Lexington. He showed a video of the expo and discussed merits of this niche economy.

Bob Quick discussed the Canadian trade mission.

Greathouse discussed the recent business expansion announcements including Tiffany & Company, Toyota, the move in of Bingham McCutchen, YS Precision Stamping (in Georgetown), Transposagen Biopharmaceuticals and Birtley Processing. She also reported on launch of the minority business accelerator meant to strengthen & expand the regional minority community.

Myers voiced his support for the efforts of Commerce Lexington.

In response to a question from Akers, Greathouse stated that while YS Precision Stamping wanted to locate in Lexington, the building and site in Georgetown was ideal for their needs.

Lawless commented on the importance of economic development activities.

Clarke commented on the importance of the IT niche.

4. Economic Development Expense & Performance Reporting

Jonathan Hollinger presented information on the 2013-2014 performance reporting mechanism. He stated that he worked with Kevin Atkins, the Mayor's Office and staff with Commerce Lexington.

Myers asked that the economic impact analysis be included in future reporting.

Beard suggested including both initial job data as well as future employment added to the data.

Akers wanted to know if the reporting system would be used by other agencies. In response Hollinger stated that all of the economic development partner agencies would be required to summit similar information.

5. Collaborative Economic Development Activities

Kevin Atkins reported that his office will be hosting quarterly meetings with the economic development partner agencies so that the group can work more collaboratively.

Clarke spoke in favor of the collaboration efforts.

The meeting adjourned at 2:15 PM.

 - b. Itinerant Merchants are also prohibited from operating on public property or within a residential or within 100 feet of a residential zone. There is an exception if the property is owned or operated by a not-for-profit and the merchant has permission. (Section 15-12(d),(e)).
 - c. Exceptions for license Mobile Food Unit Vendors, wholesalers, bazaars, and yard sales. (Section 15-13).
- 5. Penalty of not more than \$250. (Section 15-14).
- 6. Effective date of 30 days after passage.

ORDINANCE CREATING SECTION 15-12 OF THE CODE AN OF ORDINANCES, LEXINGTON-FAYETTE URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT REGULATION PERTAINING TO THE GENERAL OF ITINERANT MERCHANTS, PEDDLERS, AND DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES AND PROVIDING FOR GENERAL CONDUCT, PUBLIC SAFETY, TRANSIENT MERCHANT REGISTRATION, PARKING RESTRICTIONS, MAINTENANCE, GARBAGE AND RECYCLING REQUIREMENTS, NOISE AND LIGHTING RESTRICTIONS; HOURS OF OPERATION FROM 7 A.M. TO 11 P.M. OR LATER AND FROM 9 A.M. TO 8 P.M. FOR DOOR-TO-DOOR SALES; LOCATION RESTRICTIONS FOR PEDDLERS AND ITINERANT MERCHANTS WITH ADDITIONAL RESTRICTIONS FOR ITINERANT MERCHANTS; NO SALES BY ITINERANT MERCHANTS ON PUBLIC PROPERTY; CREATING SECTION 15-13 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES PROVIDING FOR EXCEPTIONS FOR MOBILE FOOD UNIT VENDORS, WHOLESALERS, BAZAARS, MALLS, YARD AND GARAGE SALES, AND NOT-FOR-PROFITS; AND CREATING SECTION 15-14 OF THE CODE PROVDING FOR A PENALTY IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$250.00; ALL EFFECTIVE THIRTY (30) DAYS FROM PASSAGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE LEXINGTON-FAYETTE

URBAN COUNTY GOVERNMENT:

Section 1 - That Section 15-12 of the Code of Ordinances be and hereby

is created and enacted to read as follows:

Sec. 15-12. Requirements – peddlers and itinerant merchants.

- (a) General Requirements. In addition to the licensing and other general requirements contained in the code of ordinances relating to peddlers and itinerant merchants, each such business shall also comply with the following requirements at all times while conducting business in Fayette County:
 - (1) All applicable federal, state, or local laws or regulations pertaining to their conduct and operations.
 - (2) Operate in a manner that ensures the safety of patrons, pedestrians and the public.
 - (3) If the business is a "transient" merchant, as defined in KRS 365.650, have filed a completed transient merchant application as required by KRS 365.665 with the division of revenue at least ten (10) days prior to conducting business.
 - (4) Shall not park or operate in a manner which prohibits others from parking in otherwise available spaces or areas or which creates a traffic hazard.
 - (5) Ensure that any vehicle, other conveyance, structure, or stand used in the operation of the business is maintained and kept in good operating order.
 - (6) Shall provide, in a prominent location, trash and recycling container(s) sufficient in size to collect all waste and recyclables generated by customers and staff of the vendor. All trash and debris related to the

operation shall be collected by the vendor throughout the duration of their vending and deposited in their own trash or recycling container(s) and removed from the site by the vendor. Such waste shall not be placed in urban county government trash receptacles. The vendor shall be responsible for any litter or debris located within a five feet (5') radius of their unit, including sidewalks in the immediate vicinity. Provide or make available garbage receptacle(s) sufficient for customer use.

- (7) Ensure that it operations do not violate, or contribute to a violation of the noise ordinance (section 14-70 through 14-80 of the code, as may be amended).
- (8) Shall only use lighting which is located within the area lawfully permitted for conducting the business and which does not cause any glare that could be considered a public hazard, nuisance or distraction to vehicular movement, neighboring business operations or residential uses. No flashing or strobe lighting shall be permitted.
- (9) Ensure that any and all signs are compliant with any ordinances or regulations pertaining to signage and located only within the area lawfully permitted for conducting the business.
- (10) Ensure that all merchandise, goods, or wares are only displayed or offered for sale within the area lawfully permitted for conducting the business.
- (11) Shall not use any electrical outlet located within the public right-way or on public property, unless specifically authorized by the urban county government or, if required, the utility company. A vendor shall not create any tripping or other hazard related to its use of electricity.
- (12) Shall not block access to or use of, any public bench or any public utility pole or set up any chairs or tables on the public right-of-way.
- (13) Shall not in any manner damage public property or the public right-of-way. Examples, include, but are not necessarily limited to, using stakes, rods or any method of support that is required to be drilled, driven or otherwise fixed in asphalt pavement, curbs, sidewalks or buildings. The vendor shall be solely responsible for any such damage.
- (14) Shall not locate or operate within an area closed for an emergency.
- (b) *Hours of operation.* No peddler or itinerant merchant shall engage or attempt to engage in business except during the hours of operation provided herein.
 - (1) Unless otherwise authorized by the urban county government, the general lawful hours of operation shall be limited to the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 11 p.m.

However, the hours of operation shall be allowed to continue after 11 p.m. if a permanent business also located on that parcel of property is open to the general public. In those instances, the peddler's or itinerant merchant's operation may lawfully continue to conduct business until the time at which such a permanent business is closed to the general public.

- (2) Door-to-door sales are limited to the hours of 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Door-to door sales means going from dwelling unit to dwelling unit (i.e., house, apartment, condominium, etc.) or from business to business in Fayette County selling or taking orders for, or offering to sell or take orders for, goods, wares and merchandise for present or future delivery or for services to be performed immediately or in the future whether such person has, carries or exposes a sample of such goods, wares and merchandise or not and whether he/she is collecting advance payments on such sales or not.
- (c) *Locations.* Unless otherwise permitted or authorized by the urban county government, no peddler or itinerant merchant shall locate, conduct business, or solicit in the following manner or within the following specified areas or locations:
 - Within an urban county government park unless permission of the urban county government is obtained pursuant to section 14-62 of the code of ordinances;
 - (2) In a location which causes a violation of section 17-5 of the code of ordinances (congregating so as to obstruct sidewalk), or which causes people to congregate in any street, avenue, or alley which is open to vehicular traffic;
 - (3) In a location or manner that restricts pedestrian access to any other business or building;
 - (4) In or upon any public right-of-way or public property within one hundred (100) feet of the defined boundary for a Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government permitted special event, or any other event sponsored by the urban county government, without the written permission of the event organizers or the department or division sponsoring said event or unless otherwise authorized by the urban county government.

All distances shall be measured at the shortest distance between the nearest point of the vending operation's location to the closest property line or district.

- (5) Within any other area or location in which such activity is otherwise prohibited or restricted unless all necessary permission or approval is otherwise obtained, including but not limited to the "Lexington Center Area" (section 15-1.1 of the code of ordinances).
- (d) Additional location restrictions on itinerant merchants. In addition to the restrictions listed in subsection 15-12(c),

above, no itinerant merchant shall locate, conduct business, or solicit in the following manner, or within the following specified areas or locations:

- (1) Within a Residential Zone, or within a land use zone where the underlying business activity would otherwise be prohibited under the zoning ordinance.
- (2) Within one hundred (100) feet of the property line of a dwelling unit located in an area zoned as a Residential District under the Lexington-Fayette County Zoning Ordinance.

All distances shall be measured at the shortest distance between the nearest point of the vending operation's location to the closest property line, district, or other merchant or vendor.

- (3) These restrictions shall not apply to locations owned or operated by religious, charitable, health, welfare, educational, political, or youth service organizations or neighborhood or homeowner's associations as long as the vending activities are expressly permitted in writing by the organization or association.
- (e) No itinerant merchant shall locate, conduct business, or solicit on public property, including but not limited to the public right-of-way, unless the merchant has obtained any additional appropriate licensure and such property has been designated for such use by the urban county government through a resolution, ordinance, or the adoption of a pilot program, or the government has otherwise provided express permission for such conduct.

Section 2 - That Section 15-13 of the Code of Ordinances be and hereby

is created and enacted to read as follows:

Sec. 15-13. Exceptions.

- (a) The provisions of section 15-12 of the code of ordinances shall not apply to the following:
 - (1) Properly licensed Mobile Food Unit Vendors, as defined in section 15-11.1 of the code of ordinances.
 - (2) The selling of personal property at wholesale to dealers in such articles; to newspaper carriers or newspaper vendors; to merchants or their employees in delivering goods in the regular course of business; or to vendors' products distributed or sold to regular customers on established routes.
 - (3) The selling or soliciting for the sale of goods or services at a properly licensed bazaar or sales exhibition, or on property owned or operated by the Commonwealth of Kentucky.
 - (4) The selling or offering for sale or distribution from interior private pedestrian circulation areas of shopping centers or malls of products to pedestrians

which are traversing such areas or patrons of retail stores. Such merchants or vendors are required to obtain a temporary mall merchant license pursuant to chapter 13 of the code of ordinances unless otherwise exempt.

- (5) Yard sales, garage sales, bake sales or other similar types of activities. These activities must be temporary in nature and must comply with all local ordinance and zoning ordinance provisions and must not be located on public property or public right-of-way unless expressly authorized by the urban county government.
- (b) The provisions of sections 15-12(b), (c), and (d) of the code shall not apply to vending activities by appropriately permitted merchants at a Lexington Fayette Urban County Government Special Event.
- (c) No license shall be required for any member or members of a religious, charitable, health, welfare, educational, political or youth service organization selling or offering to sell goods or services to raise funds for the work of such organization and for no other purpose.

Section 3 - That Section 15-14 of the Code of Ordinances be and hereby is created and enacted to read as follows:

Sec. 15-14. Penalty.

Any person convicted of violating any provision of section 15-12 of the code of ordinances shall be subject to a fine of not more than two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00). Each day a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 4 - If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion

of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unlawful by a court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

Section 5 -That this Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days from passage.

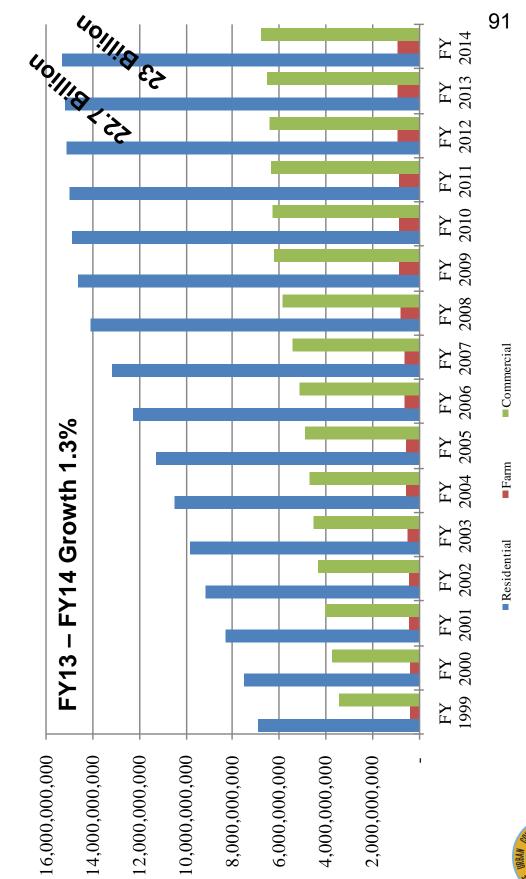

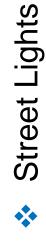

- Adopt as a general fund obligation
- Fund by 5% franchise fee



Use General Fund to pay for capital
