Dear 9th District Neighbor,

Earlier this year, the City retained Public Safety Solutions, Inc., (PSSI) an independent consulting group specializing in public safety matters, to conduct a fire station location study, to review the operational efficiency of our City's Emergency Services, and to determine the proper level of resources for the Fire Department to deploy over the next 10 years. In a nutshell, the goal was to analyze how the City should prioritize its investments in Fire and Emergency services over the next decade. The Council received an overview of the study's findings on Oct. 13th.

A portion of PSSI's findings included a recommendation to consolidate Stations 3 and 4 by 12/2025, relocate Station 2 (as planned), and relocate Stations 7 and 10. The study also touched on ongoing maintenance issues with current fire stations.

Public Safety Commissioner Ronnie Bastin advised the Council at the October 13th Council Work Session that Fire Chief Keith Jackson and his command team are now reviewing the overall recommendations to determine a plan of action. With regards to the maintenance issues, as it was stated at the Work Session, "This didn't happen overnight and you're not going to fix it overnight."

That said, I consider these issues to be of very high importance and kicking the can down the road is not an option. Providing adequate public safety is now, and always has been, one of my top priorities. I will continue to update you as events warrant.

**Concert Traffic.** If you attended, or attempted to attend, the recent Luke Bryan outdoor concert at Talon Winery, you may have experienced traffic backup frustration. Traffic was reportedly backed up 9 miles on Tates Creek road.



An estimated 20,000 people had tickets to attend the concert, but not everyone made it to the weeknight concert. Some gave up. As a result of the situation, the Council recently voted unanimously to put the issue of regulating traffic for large events in Lexington into the Council's Planning and Public Safety Committee which I chair. One answer may be to adopt a citywide event permit that would enable the Division of Police and the City's Division of Traffic Engineering to authorize the related traffic plans before another large event of this type occurs in Lexington.

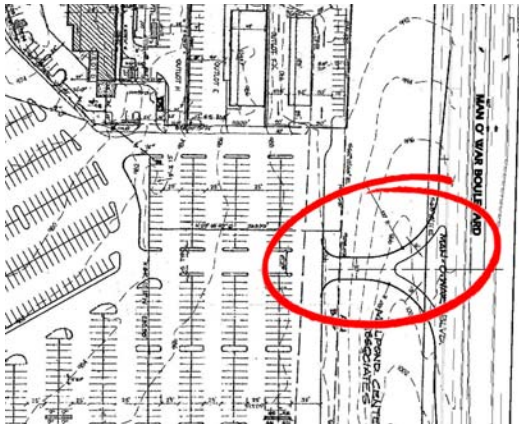

## Kroger Files Plan to add New Access to MillPond Center



Kroger has recently filed a plan with the City's Division of Planning to add a "Right in, right out" access point on Man o' War Blvd., near Boston Road in front of the Millpond Shopping Center. (See the area circled in red at left.)

If approved, it would ultimately be possible for motorists to directly enter and exit the Millpond Center via Man o' War Blvd., by turning right in and out. Historically, Planning has resisted such requests and as it stands now, this plan does not meet the current subdivision requirements. Ultimately, Kroger would need to successfully obtain a waiver in order to implement the change.

[The plan](#) will now be reviewed by the Division of Planning in conjunction with the Division of Traffic Engineering. Their findings and the overall request will tentatively be heard at the November 12th meeting of the Planning Commission, here at City Hall, 200 East Main St., at 1:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers. The meeting is open to the public.

## Consolo Expanding Lexington HQ here in 9th District

A software company that specializes in the hospice and palliative care industry is increasing its presence in Lexington. A recent press release from Governor Steve Beshear's office announced that Consolo Service Group is expanding its current location, creating 30 new jobs and investing \$730,700 into the project.



The expansion of the Consolo office off Wellington Way here in the 9th District will help the company reach a greater customer base across the country according to the press release. Consolo's programs allow for record-keeping, management and administration from patients' homes and other care facilities. Since 2004, Consolo has grown from three employees to currently more than 55 nationwide.

To encourage the investment and job growth in the community, the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority (KEDFA) preliminarily approved the company for tax incentives up to \$400,000 through the Kentucky Business Investment program. The performance-based incentive allows a company to keep a portion of its investment over the term of the agreement through corporate income tax credits and wage assessments by meeting job and investment targets.

## Breeders' Cup Week Has Something For Everyone

The Breeders' Cup is thundering into town at the end of October and the city has found dozens of ways to celebrate.

Bob Elliston, COO of the Breeders' Cup, notes that the celebration Lexington has planned and the warm welcome it has given to the Breeders' Cup are unprecedented. "We've held the Breeders' Cup World Championships all over the country, but Lexington, from record ticket sales to unparalleled local community support, might very well set the standard for future editions."

The KentuckyOne Health Breeders' Cup Festival, with most activities on or near Short Street downtown, includes music every evening at the Courthouse Plaza and in Cheapside Park, art exhibits and races on a jumbo screen at the Fifth Third Pavilion in Cheapside.

The Festival is celebrating the horse industry, of course, with horse farm tours; Sunrise Trackside at Keeneland; dedication of a plaque to John Gaines, founder of the Breeders' Cup, in Thoroughbred Park; dedication of a statue of Cigar, one of racing's all time great horses, at the Kentucky Horse Park; recognition for Isaac Murphy, a jockey who won the Kentucky Derby three times; equestrian films at the Kentucky Theatre; and Breeders' Cup Bash at the Red Mile, among other activities.

## Windstream to offer Kinetic TV service in Lexington

Update: As I noted in the September issue, there was a possibility that Windstream was going to seek to also offer cable service in Lexington., in addition to Time Warner Cable. That has now occurred. Earlier this month, the Council voted to approve a 10-year cable TV franchise agreement with Arkansas-based Windstream Communications.

According to a recent news report, Kinetic is a digital TV product delivered over existing copper and fiber phone lines, and a set-top box is required for each TV to receive service. The first set-top box is wired, but others in the home are wireless and can be moved from one TV to another. The system offers whole-house digital video recording and playback and faster channel surfing.

Lexington will be the second market for Windstream's Kinetic cable service. Lincoln, Neb., was the first community to receive the new service last spring. Windstream has previously competed in the TV marketplace by reselling Dish Network satellite TV. Service is anticipated to begin in Lexington in "late fall."

## Health Dept. to offer Free Flu Shots on Oct. 22nd

Free flu shots will be given 4-7 p.m., on Thursday, Oct. 22nd at Consolidated Baptist Church's Andrew Center at 1625 Russell Cave Road.

The seasonal flu shot is recommended to all people ages 6 months and older. Last year, Lexington had 179 confirmed cases of the flu. The health department provided 2,198 vaccinations throughout the season, including 1,500 at the free flu shot clinic.

For community members not able to get their flu shots at the special free clinic, the health department will offer flu shots 9-3 p.m. Monday through Thursday at its Public Health Clinic at 650 Newtown Pike starting Oct. 1. No appointment is necessary, and the cost for a flu shot is \$30. Medicaid/Medicare, cash, checks, credit cards and some insurances are accepted.

## Fireworks Insurance Requirement Lowered



At the October 13th Planning and Public Safety Committee meeting, City Fire Marshal and Lexington Battalion Chief Mike Farmer informed the Council Committee that the minimum insurance requirements for private groups and neighborhoods in Lexington that want to shoot off fireworks is being lowered from \$5 million to \$2 million, effective immediately.

Earlier this spring, the rate was increased to \$5 million due to several recent lawsuit settlements of fireworks-related injuries that totaled more than \$1 million dollars. According to the City's Risk Management Office, some of those lawsuits involved judgments approaching \$5 million dollars.

As reported in *The Lexington Herald-Leader*, the state presently requires a minimum \$1 million insurance policy for a fireworks permit. The \$5 million threshold necessary for a permit in Lexington was ultimately deemed to be a financial hardship for some neighborhood associations and churches in the community and thus the Lexington Fire Department decided to lower the minimum requirements for now.
