ESR Guidelines FY2025 & FY2026

OBJECTIVE:

LFUCG seeks to award grant funding to local non-profit organizations for programs and services impacting human services priority areas during Fiscal Years 2025 & 2026.



Eligibility Requirements

- Eligible Responders shall be a non-profit 501(c)3 organization with a physical presence in Lexington-Fayette County
- ESR funds cannot be used to teach, advance, advocate or promote any religion
- Be located in and/or serve Fayette County residents with ESR funds in Fayette County
- Applying organization agrees to comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws
- Agencies that are primarily affiliated with, or funded through, an educational institution (e.g., a public or private school or the Fayette County Board of Education) are not eligible to receive funds.
- Responders shall be registered and have a current, complete Gold Seal of Transparency or higher level agency portrait on <u>GuideStar.org</u>. Learn how to earn a gold seal of transparency on your GuideStar profile at <u>https://help.candid.org/s/article/Go-for-the-Gold</u>. Submission Requirements

- Program proposals shall be for a two year period of performance, FY 2025 & FY 2026 (July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2026)
- Agencies/Organizations may submit only <u>ONE</u> RFP response per Community Based Initiatives Priority Area RFP. An RFP response may contain multiple programs.
- Agencies/Organizations may submit only <u>ONE</u> RFP response per proposed program.
- Proposals must be complete and adhere to the required format.
- **<u>RFPs MUST BE SUBMITTED BY THURSDAY, APRIL 25th BEFORE 2 PM</u>** The system will automatically reject any late submission of an RFP.

ESR funding = 1% of LFUCG Revenues from FY23

Mayor's Proposed FY25 Budget (MPB) will have a placeholder amount of \$4,795,035 for ESR.

Priority Area: Community Wellness & Safety

Includes, but is not limited to:

Substance Use Disorder

Includes prevention of alcohol and drug abuse; prevention and treatment of addictive and mental disorders through programs and services for individuals who suffer from these disorders; and harm reduction.

Community Violence Prevention

which includes Gang & Gun Violence, Child Abuse & Neglect Services, Sexual Violence Prevention, Elder Abuse Prevention, Suicide Prevention and Intimate Partner Violence Prevention and Stalking.



Priority Area: Childhood & Youth Development

Includes, but is not limited to:

- Affordable access to early care & education for children under 5 years of age
- Development services focusing on life skills, social skills, employment mentoring, enrichment, language tutoring, & leadership skills
- Services focused on Kindergarten readiness
- Parental, caregiver, & kinship resources and support
- Improving reading & math proficiency
- Reducing poverty rates among children & youth
- Services for limited English language learners & for overcoming cultural barriers
- Transportation access for child & youth programming
- Addressing student learning loss (specifically kindergarten through 12th grade)
- Youth Violence Prevention
- Mentorship



Priority Area: Food Insecurity & Nutritional Access

Includes, but is not limited to:

- Programs and services with focus on reducing the recurring and/or chronic episodes of food insecurity impacting local families
- Increasing access of affordable & nutritious foods in underserved neighborhoods & communities
- Nutrition-based feeding programs for vulnerable populations



Priority Area: Mental Health

Includes, but is not limited to:

• Outpatient mental health & behavioral health:

Diagnostic evaluation, Screening, Emergency care, Crisis intervention services, Psychotherapy, Partial hospitalization or day treatment, Psychosocial rehabilitation, Medication management

Nontraditional community health interventions:

Mobile crisis units, Vocational and educational services, Training services for staff such as Trauma Informed Care. Tele-mental health/Phone/Video/Text, Integrative health and mental health

Prevention and early intervention outreach:

Community recognition and awareness of Mental Illness, Promoting/advertising resources for underserved populations, Access to services for underserved populations, Identifying the needs of the client/family and linking them to community resources, Providing case management services to empower the family unit to thrive



ESR RFP Evaluation

The Division of Procurement will administer the RFPs and evaluation process. **RFPs will be published Thursday, March 28, 2024. Response deadlines will be 4 weeks later, Thursday, April 25, 2024 at 2:00 PM.**

ESR Advisory Evaluation Committees will be constituted and comprised of LFUCG Department of Social Services' staff members, in addition to representatives of LFUCG Administration and the Social Services' Advisory Board. Proposals will be evaluated by these neutral Committees who have expertise in the field of human services.

Advisory Evaluation Committees will be convened & assigned for each of the respective funding Priority Areas. (*i.e. "Apples to Apples"*)

Emergency Shelter

Emergency Shelter funding is awarded to eligible applicants operating a shelter in alignment with the goals of the LFUCG Office of Homelessness Prevention and Intervention and the LFUCG Homelessness Prevention and Intervention Board/Lex End Homelessness Continuum of Care Board.

Funding will be awarded to organizations operating shelter services which incorporate best practices—including diversion, rapid resolution strategies, and housing-oriented case management.

This cycle of Extended Social Resource Program funding will accept proposals from both day shelters and overnight emergency shelters.



Emergency Shelter

Minimum Eligibility Requirements:

- All shelter guests must be entered into the Kentucky Homeless Management Information System (KYHMIS) or a comparable database (victim service providers).
 Data collection and timeliness must comply with the CoC's Data Quality Plan.
- Shelters must participate fully in the Housing Triage System (aka Coordinated Entry):
 - Conducting the CoC's common assessment tool
 - Entering assessment data in KYHMIS
 - Meeting all responsibilities outlined in the Housing Triage System Policies & Procedures
- Shelters must comply with anti-discrimination policies, laws, and ordinances, and not contribute to unlawful gaps in access based upon race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, or other demographics.
